Do not go to college because it's expected of you. You might end up in the 50% of all students who don't complete their degree. All statistics show that the more education you have, the more choices you have, the more money you are likely to make and the less likely you are to be unemployed.

What does that mean to you? You need to go to college because you believe you want a great education and/or because you want a career that requires it. Most careers do NOT require a 4 year degree: 63% of the jobs in 2010 will require more than a high school diploma but less than a 4-year degree.

What will you do after high school if you are not sure that college is for you?

"Voluntourism" on the rise What is voluntourism? In the broadest sense, **Voluntourism** represents voluntary service experiences that include travel to a destination in order to realize one's service intentions.

In a more refined and balanced approach, **Volun-Tourism** is the integrated combination of voluntary service to a destination with the traditional elements of travel and tourism - arts, culture, geography, history, and recreation - while in the destination.

GAP YEAR

Consider taking a gap year to help you think about what you really want to do. Gap Years are common in Britain and many organizations have developed to help support students with that type of interest. You may decide to go to work (click [here](#) to find a job), pursue your passion, travel or do community service (see below). Students who take advantage of a Gap Year frequently find that they mature, define their interests, and pursue their next step with more determination than if they hadn't had the opportunity to explore their options. Students who do decide to go to college after a gap year are more mature and more successful.
